

Bethany Fernandes from 11D demonstrated her strength and determination in the Apex Fundamental Swimming Championship while participating under the guidance of Cleopatra Sport Academy. She competed in four challenging events. "Before the races, I was incredibly nervous," Bethany shared. "It was my first time competing in four events during a single competition." Nevertheless, she turned her anxiety into commitment and showcased her abilities as a swimmer with just two-years of experience by securing gold medals in 50 meters and 100 meters backstroke including a silver in 50 meters butterfly. The entire team greatly enjoyed the first day of the event as it permitted them to not only appreciate the hard work of others but opened up an avenue to learn new things at the same time.







The Mathletes were awarded second place in the secondary category for demonstrating the Trachtenberg Method, a technique developed by mathematician Jakow Trachtenberg during his time in prison in Nazi Germany. This method allows for much faster multiplication, all without the need for pen and paper.



"Teamwork makes the dream work," said Zenaida D'Souza when asked how the teams managed to create such impressive and insightful work in such a short time, and no one could have said it better! They not only represented our school with great pride, but also learned something new throughout the process, enriching their ongoing educational journey.




Reflecting on her students' experiences, Ms Bindu, who spearheaded the competition, noted:





Representing Saint Mary's, six A-Level students, Joshua, Tasnim, Shantel, Tanisha, Allen, and Zuriel bravely stepped forward to take part in this highly competitive challenge. Despite having to go against a startling number of 142 schools, our Saintz team did not waver in their effort, as they got together and began to brainstorm their best idea yet.

Following the theme of 'The Best Environmental Project in an A.I Domain', our students proposed the idea of...a garbage can! From this simple base, our Saintz Team tirelessly built upon it before finally coming up with an entirely new product that is straightforward yet highly effective.


It can be argued that one of humanity's greatest flaws is their sheer laziness. We certainly could walk all the way to the store, and yet we constantly decide to pollute the air with the fumes of our cars. And we most definitely can spend an extra minute to find a recycling bin to dispose of our waste – and yet, we simply decide...not to? To combat this silly yet highly damaging decision, our Saintz team proposed the idea of 'Burney Boi'! A garbage can that sorts your trash for you!





"Burney Boi was the brainchild of our efforts. Through the power of Al image recognition and gravity, the device can distinguish between various types of material waste and ensure that these items are sorted correctly, eliminating the difficulties of manual separation, and reducing the risk of contamination." – SSA Saintz Team

Not only did they come up with this idea, they even planned out every nook and cranny of their prototype to explain how exactly it would function and how it should be produced; with motors, rechargeable batteries, power harnessed from the sun and sensors to bring it all together.


[&]quot;Shush don't talk," I told him quietly, "They'll find us." he nodded and stayed quiet.

THE SCIENCE ADVENTURES OF OUR PRIMARY SCHOOL STUDENTS



Resilience is clarified as the way to successfully respond to challenges, preserving mental health in the face of adversity. To students, It may look like identify difficulties as opportunities for learning, controlling one's emotions and expressing them in suitable ways, concentrating on what you can influence rather than obsessing about what you can't.

It assists individuals, groups, and systems in managing struggles, coping with uncertainty and strain, and improving over time. Such distress as pressure with time management with overwhelming schoolwork, catching sickness, suffering mental illness, or losing a loved one. With the lack of resilience, you bury yourself in issues and even burden yourself in more affliction.

Research on resilience from 2015, Resilient pupils are those who view troubles as less troublesome and are more capable of handling difficulties. However, according to studies in 2018, students were more likely to have lower GPAs if they felt that their troubles were more significant and said they had fewer tools to deal with them. Additionally, they stated that they were less resilient in the face of hardship and less able to handle the stressors.

Whether someone is resilient or not, isn't established by their birth. However, resilience is developed over the course of a person's life, and the social environment is crucial to this function.

I recall, anecdotally, being overloaded and exceedingly burnt out with the unbearable amount of schooling work to perfect in a minuscule period. I suffered through long, dragging school hours to only reach home with another pile of questions to complete for the next day. This was an exhausting cycle where I found no peace or rest, until I discovered the 5 pillars that resemble resilience.

It consists of:

1. Increasing self-awareness

Self awareness is your capacity to recognize and comprehend the elements that contribute to your unique identity, such as your behavior, values, beliefs, emotions, and thoughts.

2. Being mindful

We can improve our ability to be self-conscious by practicing mindfulness and meditation. In the practice of mindfulness, you concentrate on being fully aware of your current sensations and emotions without passing judgment or understanding.

3. Self-care

The ability to function well in the world and face the many obstacles of everyday life with confidence, vitality, and energy. It also means taking care of physical, nutritional, emotional, spiritual needs as a whole.

4. Positive relationships

Positive relationships tend to be supportive connections in which people have the opportunity to express themselves, receive emotional support, and get help when they need it. These relationships improve people's lives in many ways such as lowering rates of anxiety and depression, rising self-esteem, enhancing empathy, and building more trusting and cooperative bonds.

5. Purpose

Purpose is a sense that we are a part of and contribute to something greater than ourselves. Our purpose influences how we think and feel about other people as well as the things that happen to us. Finding your life's purpose provides more than just a sense of direction, focus, and self-worth; it also has a number of other advantages, such as improved physical health and wellbeing, providing more happiness and success, and improving interpersonal connections.

In conclusion, Resilience is effectively proven vital to everyone in society, especially to the students who face the tension of intense constraint of balance between studies and personal well-being. It should be a foremost principle that students are able to handle their hardships in life as reveals numerous benefits for not only the present but for the future as well.

Resilience is a trait



Congratulations to our Top 6 — you make us all proud!




