



The final set of 20 universities from Canada came to the school on the 29th of October. Surprised at the wide range of courses offered throughout the country, the students were made aware on the importance of their grades,

Curtin University Dubai Business Cup Challenge 2018

On the 24th of October 2018, the students of Year 12 took part in a Business Competition which was offered by Curtin University Dubai and this year's competition focused on blockchain technology as well as the use of cryptocurrency in businesses. It was a competition that lasted a month and was well contested throughout.

The interschool competition brought together 50 schools with 117 teams participating; as a result there was a competitive spirit which was felt until the Finals. Each team could have four to seven members from Grades 10 to 13 and each school could send up to four teams. Students were required to review real-world business cases, make business plans, analyze crucial business situations and present a case to an academic and professional panel of judges. Students were given an opportunity to work in a team which allowed them to use their critical-thinking and problem solving skills along with business acumen to solve issues which were found specific to the UAE.

St.Mary's had 4 teams participating each having at least 7 members with a total of 27 students representing the school, they include:

Future Billionaires (4th rank) - Team Leader: Richard Francis with Hannah D'souza, Mahima De Alwis, Pritika Tilokani, Ranya Lobo, Raphael D'souza and Soha Ahmed.

Crypto Tigers (9th rank) - Team Leader: Elizabeth George with Annora D'Souza, Bianca D'Souza, Karl Mendonca, Marushka DeSouza, Samantha Gonsalves and Tanya D'Souza.

The Capitalists (33rd rank) - Team Leader: Rithmi Akithma with Aaron Nazareth, Althea Retig, Joshua D'souza, Muhammad Ayaan, Nathan Mendes and Sherry Pithawalla.

Sparks (44th rank) - Team Leader: Rushad Patel with Ahmad Siddiqui, Laveesh Lilaramani, Megan Rodrigues, Mellanie Conceicao and Mustaheel Zaki.

This added to the effort that was put in to making all the cases unique and as best fit for the scenario to be solved by providing the necessary solutions.

The preliminary rounds were composed of three case studies that were sent online to the respective team leaders of the teams over the course of three weeks. Each week, a new case study was released and teams were asked to solve the case within one week and submit their answers every Thursday in order to earn a cumulative score which was reflected on the leaderboard and was dynamic throughout the long month of hard work; courtesy of the late submissions at times as the deadline would be at 12 in the afternoon. On the day of the submission of the fourth and final case study, it was on the same day that we had the Parent Teachers Meeting that hindered some of our efforts of uploading our answers on time. Luckily there was an extension of about two hours and so all the teams were able to submit the case studies in the last 10 minutes before the deadline. It was an intense yet enriching experience to see almost all of us trying to send the web transfer at about the same time. Pressure built up that day but we were able to face it head on.

"The Business Cup Challenge differs from a one-day competition as it focuses equally on learning as well as imparting skills necessary in real-life businesses. The objective behind this four week initiative is to prepare school leavers for the real world as they embark on a journey into the working world. Students not only compete but also learn with each case study", said Mr Daniel Adkins CEO, Curtin University Dubai's Academic Infrastructure Provider, Transnational Academic Group.





Participating students received not only scores but in-depth feedback as well on each case study submitted online; this provided great help to many teams which allowed them to further improve on their answers as the weeks went by. At the end of week three, the top 8th ranked teams moved directly into the final round to present the fourth case study on the day of the final (24th of November 2018) which took place in the Emirates Institute for Banking and Financial Studies in Dubai International Academic City.

One of the teams from our school made it to the final round by default as the Future Billionaires secured the 4th rank and were able to present their case study which lasted 10 minutes in front of the esteemed panel of judges and the other teams who looked on from their seats. Those 10 minutes went out as fast as we had finished all the Hunter Foods Gourmet Chips that was provided to us during the lunch break. The slides went one after the other as the grit was shown from the Future Billionaires throughout their presentation; it was captivating to see how well coordinated the students were in being able to talk about the use of blockchain technology to impact the education industry.



The remaining three teams and the rest of the competition went through the elevator pitch round for the finals, and two winners from that round joined the top 8th ranked teams for the presentation round as well. The elevator pitch round, presented by one team member for 40 seconds to pitch a business idea, served as a second life-line for the rest of the teams to make it to the final presentation round but sadly none of the remaining three teams were able to qualify from our school.





After the long wait of all the elevator pitches and presentations; it was finally over and the top three teams were announced by Mr. Daniel Adkins on stage.

It was unfortunate that we all had to take the certificates and medals of participation although one line remained in our heads and that was, "No team has lost today but everyone is just building towards something better and that time will tell on how well we succeed in life through pursuing all our aspirations, ideas and goals that we wish to fulfill in the upcoming future".

We would all like to thank Curtin University for organizing and making such a special competition happen and we were proud to represent our school: St. Mary's Catholic High School, Dubai. We would especially like to thank Mr. Yogesh Raje, Blockchain Advisor and Mrs. Vichitra Gabriella, Business Studies Head who helped us out in all the case studies from the extra classes to the hours spent on improving and adding to the finished answers that were sent online to Curtin University.

Emirates Environmental Group Students Workshop – November 2018



The EEG is a professional working environmental of enthusiasts who are devoted to protecting the environment through the means of education, action programs and community involvement. They are one of the most active environmental NGO's in the region. EEG's educational programs raise proactive individuals, hold who important role in making the changes necessary to sustain our

planet. One such program was a workshop for the primary students to provide them with an opportunity to maximize knowledge and skills on the current sustainability issues and to inculcate a sense of awareness, responsibility and care for one's environment. It was held at the **Rashid School for Boys** on the 5th of November, 2018. Several schools participated in this event. The students who represented the St. Mary's Catholic High School were; Danielle, Reuben, Nayef and Rihaan from Year 6. They were very excited to participate in this event and were in awe of the huge campus as well as its natural surroundings - they even saw a giant tortoise! Refreshments and lunch were provided as well!

The main focus of this workshop was about the four main elements that influence humanity - Fire, Water, Land and Air. Thus, the theme - 'Elements Define us'.

The element of 'AIR': The students were given cards with the names of different GHG's (Greenhouse Gases) like carbon dioxide, carbon monoxide, CFC (Chlorofluorocarbon) etc. These were described as 'deadly for the ozone layer'. The students learned that methane was roughly 30 times more potent as a heat-trapping gas. The activity for the element of air was to pin the cards on a picture of a landscape in places where they thought that these greenhouse gases came from. They also discussed how these gases could be controlled by planting more trees, using renewable energy etc.



The element of 'FIRE': It was explained that fire is a form of energy. It had good and bad aspects, which were briefed to the students. Some of the other forms of energy discussed were solar energy, wind energy, geothermal energy, etc. Students were asked to create a superhero which would save humanity in different real-life scenarios such as forest fire, earthquake, poisonous gas leak etc. They could draw and name their superhero.

The element of 'LAND': Students had to make a food plate by choosing some food items from the given list; each having a certain number on it. Volunteers checked the food plates and added the numbers on the food items chosen. They explained that the higher the total value, the larger the environmental pollution. E.g. The juice and fizzy drinks that are packed in PET bottles cause environmental pollution during large scale production, transportation, refrigeration and packing.



The element of 'WATER': An outdoor activity was conducted in which there was a 'mini ocean', i.e. a blue mat that had all the latest plastic waste collected by the Emirates Environmental Group themselves. Students were divided into different groups and each group had three checkers and six runners. The runners had to run and get any type of plastic

items from the 'ocean' and the checkers had to check and sort what type of plastic it was. For example, the checkers with the number 1 got all the PETE items (Polyethylene Terephthalate) The only way to check the type of plastic was to check the number on it. The number '1' checkers collected the maximum items which were made of PETE and they belong to plastic items that could be recycled.

They also met the chairperson of a company called 'Simply Bottles', who explained the problems about disposing plastic. The students learned about the four different types of plastic. They were: Low-Density Polyethylene (LDPE), Polypropylene (PP), Polyethylene



Terephthalate (PETE or PET) and High-Density Polyethylene (HDPE). They were surprised to learn that plastic could be shredded, melted and woven into threads to make a fabric that could be used to make T shirts mixed with cotton. She was wearing one of those T Shirts made of 50% plastic! The workshop ended with a closing ceremony in which the students were given certificates. It was indeed an enriching learning experience for them!

Hand Washing

On Monday morning, 12th November, 2018, it was announced in the morning assembly that year 1 to 4 students are going to attend a special session on 'Washing Hands'. We all got excited to hear this and awaited the programme excitedly.

As the bell for the fourth period rang, we were all summoned towards Bishop Gremoli Hall. We all sat down but were little noisy because of the anticipation and buzz in the air.



One important factor in keeping yourself and others healthy lies within our own hands – literally.

Proper hand-washing is one of the best and easiest ways to avoid getting sick and spreading germs to others, according to DIRECT CARE.

The goal of the session was to raise awareness on 'Hand Washing' among the little future investors. We were able to achieve this goal through the interesting video on 'Hand Washing', engaging discussions and the effective questioning done by the facilitator, Ms. Noura, representative from Directore.

She expressed varied ideas and methods of reducing the harmful effects of not washing hands in daily life. Ms. Noura also shared her expertise on the benefits of washing hands on a daily basis, especially using **anti-bacterial** Dettol products, e.g. soaps, liquid soaps, hand sanitizers, wipes etc.



The session consisted of discussions and activities that allowed us, the participants, to share and explore different ideas that we as individuals could apply in our lives to overcome the diseases which spread only because of not washing hands, such as influenza (recently diagnosed as lifethreatening disease). It raised our awareness as kids to know the most 'targeted times' of the day that we need to wash our hands:



- a. Before eating any type of food during any time of the da
- b. After eating
- c. After using toilets
- d. After Playing outside

The session's main focus was on washing hands properly which is meant for most of the kids is simply placing hands under running water for a few seconds. But in reality it takes much more than simply placing your hands under running water for a few seconds.

How can adults help make sure children are washing hands correctly? Here's the correct procedure. Teaching these steps is usually a "work in progress":

STEPS TO FOLLOW

- 1. Wet hands with water.
- 2. Lather up with soap. Be sure to lather the backs of hands, between fingers, and under nails.
- 3. Scrub hands for 20 seconds about the time it takes to say the alphabet slowly or hum the "Happy Birthday" song twice.
- 4. Rinse hands well under running water
- 5. Dry hands using a clean towel.



It was a truly eye opening session; nothing lost, but a lot gained as the students all left Bishop Gremoli Hall wiser, with a booklet consisting of the instructions on 'Hand washing', an interesting maze and names of Dettol products for keeping clean.

Business Competition: SP Jain's Annual Brain Simulator Contest

As the school term of 2018 began, a number of extracurricular activities arose for the students of St. Mary's Catholic High School; one of these activities being SP Jain's Annual Brain Simulator Contest, which was held on the 25th of October.



The contest centers on allowing students to experience situations imitating those involved in a real business through a multi-player simulation game. Aspects of the game specifically draw on a student's decision- making ability put in the context of a business scenario. The Brain Simulator Contest, abbreviated as BrainSim, comprised of two rounds: the elimination round and the business simulation round. The contest was made interesting by the fact that it was open to any and all students, whether they were of the commerce stream or not. This gave everyone an equal chance to get to know about the way a business may work.

The elimination round was an online aptitude test. Students were required to register online.

Students were also able to access certain sample tests which gave us the chance to familiarize ourselves with the format of the upcoming aptitude test. The window of time when we could answer the test was given in an email a couple of days before it is taken. Questions challenging our reasoning ability, and English and Math prowess determined whether we would qualify for the final round. The 3 test toppers from each school would be called for the final simulation round on Thursday, 25th of October.

From our school, Althea Retig, Bianca D'souza, and Annora D'souza (Year 12) topped and moved on to the next round.

On the morning of the final round, the team of three students made their way to SP Jain School of Global Management. The Brain Simulation contest spanned the entirety of the day, from the

9:30AM to 4PM in the afternoon. With no prior experience and only information from the SP Jain website, the three of us headed into the competition with confidence and enthusiasm. The team was also provided with an agenda upon arrival.

Despite the duration, time passed fairly quickly once the affairs began. Due to the number of participants, there were two batches of teams who would be undertaking the simulation; our school's team was in the first batch who were able to begin the game.

Designed by Harvard, the simulation task assigned to the groups was to adopt eco-friendly products as innovation directors of a sunglass company. The challenge was to convince your coworkers to accept the proposal in the least amount of weeks, with each decision made costing the players valuable time and credibility, but at the same time, enabling them to garner support. In a matter of three hours, the simulation was completed.

However, SP Jain still had much more to offer. While the first batch undertook the business simulation, the second batch was able to participate in team building exercises. After lunch, the

roles were reversed. The teams coming in from the first batch were able to enjoy the activities offered by the volunteersone of which included constructing a casing that should enable an egg to survive a five-storey fall... safely. The participants were not the only ones that experienced a recreational activity; the teachers who accompanied the teams also had a gathering held in the morning as students were being briefed. This allowed for a rapport between students and teachers from many different schools all over UAE and it made the event unforgettable.

STOP BULLYING, STOP DISASTER

"Bullying is killing our kids. Being different is killing our kids and the kids who are bullying are dying inside. We have to save our kids whether they are being bullied or are bullying. They all are in pain." - Cat Cora

The Center for Disease Control (CDC) states that approximately 4,400 deaths occur among young people from suicide each year, 22% of which are from bullying cases. There are about 100 attempts of suicide to every 1 successful suicide. A little over 14% of students in high school consider suicide and just about 7% of them attempt suicide.

Bullying is intentionally aggressive behaviour repeated over time, which involves an imbalance of power. In most scenarios, bullying can be a serious act of prejudice, discriminating against a person's way of life, nation, race, and culture. This can result in violence, and disturbances in the child's behaviour. Bullying can affect physical and emotional health, both in the short term and later in life. It can lead to physical injury, social problems, emotional problems and even death. Children and adolescents who are bullies are at increased risk for substance use, academic problems and violence to others later in life behavior

There are different types of bullying:

- 1. Physical bullying: They hurt you physically for example pinching, kicking and punching.
- 2. Verbal bullying: They hurt you verbally for example calling names and insulting
- 3. **Social bullying:** They hurt you behind your back and try to ruin your social reputation for example lying and spreading rumors, encouraging others to ignore/exclude you.
- 4. **Cyber bullying:** Nowadays, the population for media platforms has increased drastically, especially for children. This doesn't allow them to socialize with many people in person, and, if the gadgets are taken away, some people tend to take their anger out on others in school. It is a form of bullying that is increasingly common nowadays, used mostly by teenagers and young adults. Cyber bullying hurts you through social media by using hurtful texts, images or videos, and hacking your account. Thus, we must protect the account with Cyber-Security apps. After an encounter with a Cyber-bully, gain time for mindfulness, inform an adult, and block the user.

Keep an eye out for these signs that someone is being bullied:

- Mysterious injuries
- Lost or torn clothes or books, etc.
- Pretending to be sick
- Constant nightmares
- Falling grades
- Running away from home
- Not listening to parents

So how can we stop bullying? We can do so by first and foremost recognizing bullying for what it is. Training children to first ignore the bully, then walk away and then tell an adult. In case this doesn't work at school one can approach teachers, counselors and finally the child protection officer who, for us at St. Mary's Catholic High School, is Miss Lise Ann. The government, schools, parents and all stakeholders must be involved to get rid of this grave problem and to empower each young person with the necessary skills to deal with and overcome such situations.

The following is information that is currently ongoing on the part of the UAE Government and our school. <u>UAE Government initiatives:</u> On April 21st 2018, the Ministry of Education (MoE) organized the **National Bullying Prevention Week** to raise awareness on bullying in partnership with more than 20 local and federal entities. Dubai Police have launched a **'Safety Ambassadors'** programmer that has seen training of 72 students drawn from government and private schools to report any bullying and illegal activity. Extensive provisions within its UAE Penal Code (Federal Law No. 3 of 1987), and the Cyber Crimes Law (Federal Decree No. 5 of 2012) on **Defamation**, which is often at the core of cyber bullying.

<u>School initiatives:</u> On November 20th 2018, the school arranged a talk on Cyber Bullying so that students can be aware of it. Anti-bullying Champions are nominated in each class to report and stop bullying. School takes strict action against bullies.

Armed with this information together we can and will put an end to bullying in this nation and all over the world.
